The "Roosevelt Portals" are those grand cast stone (concrete) gateway portals to Ala Moana Park at the foot of Atkinson Boulevard. They were designed by architect Harry Sims Bent, under the direction of Lester McCoy who was Chairman of the Honolulu Park Board at the time. The fifteen foot high portals are reminiscent of triumphal arches with their geometric motifs. Originally, these portals served as the Waikiki side entrance to the park with circular traffic movement around them; with the realignment of Ala Moana Boulevard, traffic now flows only through the west portal.

The City gained title to the land in 1928 to build a park; originally called Moana Park, it was renamed Ala Moana Park in 1947. Referred to as "the people's park" due to the variety of activities held there, the park was developed through federal funds during the Depression Era under US President Franklin Delano Roosevelt's New Deal, and a desire in Honolulu for civic beautification.

They are named the "Roosevelt Portals" as they were dedicated by President Roosevelt on July 27, 1934 at 3:00 pm, during his visit to the Hawaiian Islands.
