The SFCA appoints the members of the AASC, which is generally composed of two SFCA commissioners, two staff members, and three visual arts consul-

Four committee members must be present to conduct the selection process and develop recommendations. If you would like to apply to be a Visual Arts Consultant, the application and instructions are on our website. It's sort of like jury duty for art professionals, part of your civic responsibility. Please apply as there is always a need, especially on neighbor islands.

From page 1 recommending works of art to be selected. For each acquisition visit, each AASC member may nominate up to five works of art, all of which are critiqued as a group by the committee. After the critique, the committee votes on the nominations to determine which work of art will receive an SFCA Acquisition Award. The AASC recommends Acquisition Awards only by consensus and is not obligated to make awards if no suitable works are available during a site visit.

The presentation of an SFCA Acquisition Award means that the particular work of art has been given a recommendation for purchase. It does not mean that the SFCA necessarily has purchased or will purchase that particular work of art.

What is the process?

The Relocatable Works of Art Program presents its award recom-

mendations to the SFCA Commission at its regular bi-monthly meetings. The Commission makes its final decision by, if possible, viewing the actual artworks recommended by the AASC. If the Commission decides not to acquire a recommended artwork for the Relocatable Works of Art Collection, then the work of art is returned to the artist or representing organization.

How does an exhibit apply for a visit?

Eligible museums, galleries and arts organizations can request that a HSFCA Acquisition Award Selection Committee visit an exhibition as part of the ongoing art acquisition process for the Art in Public Places Collection. To request a committee visit, please read the Acquisition Award Selection Committee Exhibition Visit Guidelines Form carefully and submit a Request Form to the

Hawai'i State Foundation on Culture and the Arts. Requests must be received at least 6 months prior to the exhibition opening date.

Art Lunch Lecture – Jon Hamblin: At This Moment

Tuesday, November 24, Noon -1 p.m., Hawai'i State Art Museum, Free

ulti-media artist Jon Hamblin will share stories and images of his artworks with the Art Lunch audience at noon Nov. 24 at HiSAM. His inspirations come from many sources, including seemingly unrelated ones: bodysurfing, the poet W.S. Merwin, and Sistine Chapel frescoes. The diversity of these influences reflect a childhood lived in many places, among them Manhattan, Haiti, the Mojave Desert and Kaua'i. Hamblin is known for his colorful and witty artworks, producing canvases mysteriously populated by earthly (and unearthly) beings, as well as intriguing multi-media artworks that combine poetry with 3-dimensional forms and 2-dimensional imagery.

Two of his paintings, "Blue Angel Dancing" and "Zima's Note" are currently on view in HiSAM galleries. He earned two degrees, a B.A. in psychology and an M.F.A. in Fine Arts, from the University of Hawai'i, and has taught art at Mid-Pacific Institute for over 30 years.

Matching funds battle could bring concert series to HiSAM





VOTING ENDS NOVEMBER 30 levittamp.org

he Friends of the Hawai'i State Art Museum (FHiSAM) is now in the running to bring a 10-week live music series to Honolulu during the summer of 2016 and they need your help.

Sponsored by Levitt Pavilions, the national nonprofit behind the largest free concert series in America, FHiSAM hopes to qualify as one of the 15 winning organizations competing in the Levitt AMP Grant Awards.

The funds for the concerts are a matching grant opportunity created by Levitt Pavilions to serve small to mid-sized towns and cities up to 400,000 people. Fifteen nonprofits, or municipalities partnering with a nonprofit, will receive up to \$25,000 each to produce their own outdoor, free concert series featuring a diverse lineup of professional musicians to be held on the museum's front lawn.

FHiSAM submitted the proposal which is now posted on

the Levitt AMP website for public voting. http://levittamp.org

A successful campaign depends on community participation to get as many online votes as possible to bring the concert series to Honolulu. Community support, as measured by the number of online votes received, will be one of the key factors when Levitt Pavilions selects the 15 winners.

Supporters are asked to visit https://grant.levittamp.org/voter-registration-page/ to register and vote. Online public voting is now open and ends Nov. 30 at 5 p.m. Pacific Time. The Top 25 finalists will be selected through online public voting. Levitt Pavilions will then review the proposals of these 25 finalists and 15 winners will be announced on January 5, 2016.

The Friends of HiSAM asks supporters to start spreading the word to family, friends, colleagues and neighbors and rally the community to sign up and vote for FHiSAM's proposal.

Music, Shopping, Food Make Find Art a Hit at HiSAM

n Friday, October 2 the Hawai'i State Art Museum hosted FIND ART at HiSAM, an Art+Flea arts and music festival on the lawn and museum grounds.

Presented by the Friends of HiSAM and FLUX Hawaii, FIND ART featured more than 20 craft and food vendors, live performances, and arts workshops by HiSAM-supported artists.

More than 850 people attended the

event which celebrated the Hawai'i-based community of visual and performance artists that the State Foundation on Cuslture and the Arts has long supported.

Art and food vendors mixed alongside workshops throughout the first and second floors of the museum.

Honolulu Printmakers gave a handson demonstration in the upstairs lanai area and KTUH deejays performed in the Sculpture Garden. First Friday artist Slack-key performer Dayton Watanabe provided mellow music in the Sculpture lobby while live bands were staged on the front lawn.

Many guests took part in an Instagram scavenger hunt through the museum for a chance to win an interisland trip to Maui on Island Air.

The next FIND ART event is scheduled for March 19, 2016 and will be free and open to the public.
